HB 619: Sovereign Immunity for Professional Firms

Senate Companion Bill: Not Yet Filed

GENERAL BILL by Tuck

Sovereign Immunity for Professional Firms; Provides that professional firms or their employees when performing specified services for certain public projects are considered agents of state or its applicable subdivision when acting within scope of their contract; requires that contracts with such firms must, to extent permitted by law, provide indemnity to state or its applicable subdivision.

HB 149: Continuing Contracts

Senate Companion Bill: SB 656

GENERAL BILL by Rep. Alvarez

Revises maximum estimated construction cost of construction projects for which governmental entity may enter into continuing contract; revises definition of term "continuing contract"; requires DOT to select certain number of qualified firms & authorize work in specified manner for certain continuing contracts. Effective Date: 7/1/24

SB 656: Continuing Contracts

GENERAL BILL by DiCeglie

Continuing Contracts; Revising the maximum estimated construction cost of construction projects for which a governmental entity may enter into a continuing contract; revising the definition of the term "continuing contract"; requiring the Department of Transportation, for specified testing continuing contracts, to select a certain number of qualified firms and assign such testing in a specified manner, etc.

Continuing Education Requirements; Requiring, rather than authorizing, a board, or the Department of Business and Professional Regulation when there is no board, to allow by rule that distance learning may be used to satisfy continuing education requirements; revising the requirements that such continuing education must satisfy; requiring the board, or the department when there is no board, to exempt certain individuals from completing their continuing education requirements; authorizing the department to adopt emergency rules, etc.

GENERAL BILL by Melo

Continuing Education Requirements; Requires, rather than authorizes, board, or DBPR when there is no board, to provide by rule that distance learning may be used to satisfy continuing education requirements; revises requirements that continuing education must satisfy; requires board, or DBPR when there is no board, to exempt certain individuals from completing their continuing education requirements; requires DBPR & each affected board to adopt rules. Effective Date: 7/1/2024

GENERAL BILL by Rep. Robinson

Alternative Mobility Funding Systems; Revises requirements relating to agreements to pay for or construct certain improvements; authorizes local governments to adopt alternative mobility planning & fee system; prohibits alternative system from imposing responsibility for funding existing transportation deficiency on new development; prohibits local governments that do not issue building permits from charging for transportation impacts; prohibits local governments from assessing multiple charges for same transportation impact; revises requirements for calculation of impact fees; requires local governments transitioning to alternative funding systems to provide holders of impact fee credits with full benefit of intensity & density of prepaid credit balances as of specified date. Effective Date: 7/1/2024

GENERAL BILL by [Martin](#)

Alternative Mobility Funding Systems; Authorizing certain local governments to adopt an alternative mobility planning and fee system or an alternative system in certain circumstances; prohibiting an alternative system from imposing responsibility for funding an existing transportation deficiency upon new development; providing that only local governments issuing building permits may charge for transportation impacts; revising requirements for the calculation of impact fees by certain local governments and special districts, etc. Effective Date: 7/1/2024

GENERAL BILL by Sen. Brodeur

Sovereign Immunity; Increasing the statutory limits on liability for tort claims against the state and its agencies and subdivisions; prohibiting an insurance policy from conditioning payment of benefits on the enactment of a claim bill; specifying that the limitations in effect on the date a final judgment is entered apply to that claim, etc.

GENERAL BILL by McFarland

Suits Against the Government; Abolishes common-law doctrine of home venue privilege with respect to action against state; increases statutory limits on liability for tort claims against state & its agencies & subdivisions; authorizes subdivision of state to settle claim in excess of statutory limit without further action by Legislature regardless of insurance coverage limits; prohibits insurance policy from conditioning payment of benefits on enactment of claim bill; specifies limitations in effect on date final judgment is entered apply to that claim; requires DFS to adjust limitations on tort liability every year after specified date; revises period within which certain claims must be present to certain entities; revises exceptions relating to instituting actions on tort claims against state or one of its agencies or subdivisions; revises period after which failure of certain entities to make final disposition of claim shall be deemed final denial of claim; revises limit on certain attorney fees; revises statute of limitations for tort claims against state or one of its agencies or subdivisions & exceptions thereto.
